ministry and legacy.

Dr. Arlin Horton, president emeritus of Pensacola Christian College, has led his life with a desire to honor the Lord. Now in retirement, his latest adventure included getting remarried; but he's not forgetful of his past. Since he and Mrs. Beka Horton first arrived in Pensacola, Florida, in their 1935 Plymouth, he's seen what great things the Lord can do through willing servants.

MINISTRY THROUGH CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Since its inception, PCC has offered quality Christian education at an affordable price that won't burden graduates as they follow God's calling—a goal that the Hortons prioritized. They wanted to provide a way for students locally and nationally to attend a Christian college and train to become godly leaders across the country. Using the same distinctive framework established at Pensacola Christian School (now Academy), the new college taught undergraduates with unsurpassed excellence in generalized and specialized fields through liberal arts education.

Adding to the College's affordability, the Hortons developed avenues for students to receive financial aid while studying for a degree. When Dr. Horton began his college career, he waited tables in the dining hall as part of a student work program to pay for his education. "When we started PCC, a similar program for working students was provided for them to work their way through college and graduate owing nothing or very little," he shared. "I understand this



year PCC will have 2,000 students in their work program, and I assume many of them will graduate debt-free-what a golden opportunity to potentially graduate and step out in life debt-free."

The Hortons' ministry shared the gospel and provided opportunities for Christian education across the country and around the world. "I'm sure, with the culture in our country changing so fast, it may be very difficult for the Christian population to have the freedom they have today, but hopefully PCC will be able to continue with the foundational principles established through 38 years of my leadership," said Dr. Horton. Now, carrying on their legacy, PCC and its affiliated ministries are still reaching others for Christ through Christian education.

ASK THE LORD FOR WISDOM IN ALL YOUR DECISION MAKING.

Everything that Arlin and Beka Horton did, they did as a pair. Beka put feet to Arlin's vision for Christian education, and both were well suited to their educational and administrative roles, completely trusting the Lord with what came next. "Beka was selfless, never seeking glory or attention to herself," he explained. "She was a very good manager. She could easily see new opportunities for service. I believe the Lord used Beka more than anyone to develop and make PCC (and its ministries) what it is today." Together, they contributed 60 years to Christian service in the Pensacola area since arriving in 1952. "It's wonderful to look back and know that Beka and I had leading roles in starting and guiding PCC and all its ministries and then to see they have grown with much fruit from the Lord."

THANKFUL FOR GOD'S **PROVISIONS**

Before retiring as PCC administrators in 2012, Dr. Arlin and Mrs. Beka Horton didn't do a great deal of looking back on their personal ministry; they didn't have the time! Each day and each hour had been filled with maintaining and improving the work set before them. And when they finally did reflect on their ministry, the Hortons always credited the Lord for the provisions and progress. "There are three things that have made us successful: God's blessing, dedicated personnel, and a Christian philosophy of education," said Dr. Horton.

Passing the torch to the next administration allowed the Hortons to enter a new season together. After a few years of rest, Arlin began caring for Beka as her health deteriorated; and on June 27, 2020, the Lord took her home. Arlin faced loneliness through the ongoing lockdowns at the time. "I told the Lord, 'If You want me to be single the rest

> of my life, I can do it with You by my side; however, I sure

would like to have a godly mate who I could love and who would love me," he shared.


Even in retirement, Dr. Horton saw the Lord provide for his needs. The following April, he met Wilma Pierce, a former educator and a widow who had lost her husband of 62 years in 2017. After sharing heartfelt conversations and spending careful time in prayer, Arlin and Wilma were married privately by Dr. Joel Mullenix in Gettys Allen's home on July 14, 2021. "Now, Wilma and I know that, because of our age, we may have a very short time together; however, we are praying that we will have several years," he explained. "We have decided to celebrate our wedding anniversary monthly." They have enjoyed almost 30 months together at this article's publication. And together, they are also celebrating PCC's 50th school year, participating in Alumni Homecoming and other special events on campus.

If the Lord tarries and allows PCC another 50 years, Dr. Horton knows how he would encourage future graduates. "Do what's right! Keep a close walk with the Lord," he urged, echoing advice he's always shared with others. "Ask the Lord to give you a vision of how He could use you. Ask the Lord for wisdom in all your decision making."

CHERYL REID

The second student to apply to PCC, Cheryl Reid, shares a legacy as timeless as the College.

A year before Pensacola Christian College officially opened in 1974, Cheryl Reid (Elementary Education '78) enrolled, becoming the second student to join the College's very first student body. Her aunt and uncle, Gettys and Lois Allen, who had been serving faithfully beside Dr. Arlin and Beka Horton, urged her to attend. "We're starting a college next fall; you should come!" they told her. And she did. Today, she shares a legacy alongside PCC.

THE EARLY DAYS

That first year, PCC welcomed 100 students, all eager to gain a Christian college education. "We all knew each other—we really were like a family," Reid said, thrilled to be a part of a smaller group of students. The College had one building, Ballard, which provided everything a college campus needed, from classrooms and a library to a cafeteria and chapel auditorium.

As college life began, Reid and her classmates could see how delighted Dr. and Mrs. Horton were to have them. "You could tell they were so excited. Dr. Horton was very soft-spoken, as he is now, but he sure had a twinkle in his eye—you could catch his excitement," Reid remembered.

"Mrs. Horton realized her position as an example to the girls of godliness and what a Christian woman should be in her dress, her speech, and her mannerisms," she continued. "They were very approachable, and we knew they were very interested in our lives spiritually as well as academically."

Because the students spent practically all their time together, they got to know each other and created

traditions that are still enjoyed today. "As small as we were, the administration made sure we didn't miss out on a typical Christian college experience. We enjoyed formal dinners and the very first Turkey Bowl game," Reid recalled. "Most students probably never thought about all the work and planning that went into that first year to take care of 100 students."

We all knew each other we really were like a family.

Reid's fondest memories from her time as a student were making friendships that have lasted over the years. "Social media has allowed me to reconnect with some and stay in close touch with others," she commented.

And while studying elementary education, Reid gained valuable experience that she's applied throughout her career. "From my very first education class, I couldn't get enough," Reid shared. "I loved learning the teaching methods that had been tried and proven in the classrooms of Pensacola Christian School [now Academy]. The teachers I studied under had all been master teachers, and their love of teaching was contagious."

After graduation, Reid began her ministry as an educator. "I always had the desire to teach," she said. As she and her husband, Dwight, moved back and forth from Florida and the Carolinas, she taught elementary









grades in several Christian schools, gathering 20 years of teaching experience. "PCC had a great influence on my life," Reid declared. "God graciously allowed me to use the principles, truths, and teaching methods I learned as a student while I worked in several Christian schools and ministries."

With her heart for teaching children, Reid is familiar with the challenge of helping struggling students succeed—but in her years in the classroom, she always found it so rewarding to see the realization in a student's eye when a concept had been grasped. And she kept at the forefront of her mind what she learned at PCC: using education to communicate the love of Christ. "It is always worth the extra effort to make a difference in the lives of children; to assure them that you believe in them, and to love them as Christ does," she said.

In 2003, the Reids were living in Greenville, South Carolina, and the door was opened for Cheryl to expand her expertise, working at Majesty Music for ten years. "When Ron Hamilton learned that I enjoyed writing poetry, I had the privilege of [collaborating on] both *Patch the Pirate* songs and adult choral songs," Reid said. "It was always a joint effort, and I learned a great deal from him."

THE HEARTBEAT OF EDUCATION

With a love for education matched with a skill in writing, Reid returned to her alma mater in 2017. She now

works for Abeka Publishing, writing curriculum and mentoring young writers as they begin their careers. "I'm starting my seventh year in my current position," she said. "I'm part of a team that writes and revises elementary history and science texts; I also enjoy writing fictional stories and poetry for our elementary reading books." As she writes and mentors, she sees the opportunity she has to continue the legacy that the Hortons began instilling back in 1974.

As a lead writer and mentor for Abeka's elementary products, Reid is constantly challenged to research thoroughly and improve her writing techniques. She loves sharing the mission that Mrs. Beka Horton established: that the heartbeat of Christian education is getting children saved.

"Knowing that what we do in Abeka reaches thousands of students is both a blessing and a challenge," Reid admitted. "We want to produce exceptional educational resources, but we also have the privilege and responsibility of encouraging a biblical worldview and critical thinking in the students we reach." Looking back to the early days of PCC and the start of a rewarding career in education, Cheryl Reid is grateful that God would use her to do things for Him that stretch and grow her spiritually.

"God, who is patient and merciful, has never stopped working on me," she said. "I am incredibly thankful for His love, His forgiveness, and His grace."



DR. JIM SCHETTLER

Faithfully & Joyfully Serving





Believers young and old are encouraged and uplifted by Dr. Jim Schettler's joyful countenance and thoughtful messages.

Those who have sat in a service with Dr. Jim Schettler (Bible '79) have seen him practically leap to the pulpit, eager to share the promises from his Savior. And over his 45 years of ministry, his messages have marked spiritual moments in listeners' lives. Whether pastoring, teaching, or traveling across the country, he has appreciated every opportunity to joyfully share what the Lord has laid on his heart. "You go where the Lord wants you," said Dr. Schettler. And, like many alumni, he saw God begin shaping the trajectory of his life while attending PCC.

A DESIRE TO SERVE

When Dr. Schettler arrived at PCC in 1975, it was a little-known Christian college—one with a small student body dedicated to honoring the Lord. As Christian service ministries and Campus Church opportunities became available, he quickly "caught the spirit" and got involved in any way he could. "I got here, and I just loved serving the Lord," he said. He soon switched from speech to studying Bible. "By my second year, I knew I wanted to be in ministry."

Dr. Schettler held a variety of student leadership positions that prepared him for becoming a pastor. Throughout his college career, he served as a floor leader, the Pi Kappa Cougars collegian president and vice president, Mission Prayer Band chaplain, and Student Body president. "Those opportunities fed my passion for service," he shared. "I do not have a [specific] day that I was called to preach, but the Bible says, 'Delight thyself also in the Lord: and he shall give thee the desires of thine heart' (Psalm 37:4). As I've served the Lord, He just gives me another desire—I go, 'Well, that must be God'; I'm willing to do whatever God wants. The door is open, and I want to go through it."

LEADERSHIP AND MINISTRY AT PCC

After graduating from college, Dr. Jim Schettler traveled for two years as a PCC representative, preaching two to three times a day at Christian schools, summer camps, and churches. After his first year, he married Marilee (Elementary Education '80), and she joined him for the second year. "We didn't know where we were going to go at the end of [the] two years traveling," he explained. They made plans, and for six months, they lived in a kibbutz in Israel with Baptists for Israel Institute. "Serving with the Israelis formulated my entire ministry from that point on. We came back, and I was youth pastor of Campus Church for 7 years, then I became interim [pastor], and then pastor for 18 years."

The time Dr. Schettler led Campus Church included engaging messages, memorable illustrations, and shared memories that students, staff, faculty, and community members of that time reminisce about today. Students regularly quoted phrases and slogans that were reminders on having the right attitude when dating, refusing to gossip, keeping a clean testimony, and following God's will.

"Oh, what would we ever have done without Pastor Schettler?!" said Tina Boles (Early Childhood '00). "Pastor Schettler's sermons were always right on target,

useful, and packed full of wisdom. Even if I can't remember all of the titles or points of each message, the memories of sitting in the Dale Horton [Auditorium] amongst all of my classmates, being fed the Word of God by a man who so evidently loves the Lord and so strongly desires to share that with all of us, is a warm memory."

Even those who knew Dr. Schettler as a college student were encouraged by his ministry at Campus Church. "Jim was my floor leader my freshman year. I remember his sense of humor!" shared Rod See (A.S. Printing Program '81). "His genuine compassion and heart for the Lord shined through in all that he did. I have cooked steaks for the Men's Steak-Out ever since he introduced that ministry to the Campus Church. I remember him meeting with us in heartfelt prayer before each one."

FOLLOWING THE LORD'S LEADING


Since 2011, Dr. Jim Schettler has been teaching modular classes on the Bible, counseling, and youth ministry at a California Bible college. When classes aren't in session, he spends the rest of the year in full-time ministry, "equipping and encouraging the saints across the country." He enjoys nothing more than helping bring others to an understanding of biblical truths. "I love to see people's faces when I'm speaking and know I'm connected with them," he shared. "Seeing the Word of God received in people's hearts, and then lived out—that's the most exciting thing. You're teaching them something from God's Word, and they go, 'You know what? I can do that! I understand now."

In spring 2024, Dr. Schettler will join his PCC family for Legacy Bible Conference, one of the events celebrating the College's 50th school year. He's excited to be included in the celebration. "The people of Pensacola Christian College were the tools that God used to form me in my life, my walk with the Lord, and my ministry," Dr. Schettler said. "They were my mentors, my prayer warriors, my friends who we laughed with, who we cried with—everything!"

Dr. Jim Schettler is encouraged by how he's seen God continue to work in his own life and in the lives of others. "One of the great joys that I have as I travel all over the country and all over the world is coming across our graduates that have stayed faithful. And, you know, the longer I live, it's not about abilities and talents. It's just about being faithful," he shared. "Stay faithful to the things of God."

AN ADVOCATE ON CAPITOL HILL

During college, getting plugged in to Christian Service opportunities was easy for Olivia Summers (Political Science '23). She continues to serve the Lord today as the U.S. Government Relations Assistant for the American

Association of Christian Schools, an opportunity she discovered after connecting with an alumna through PCC's mentorship program.

As she helps monitor federal legislation, Olivia influences areas of education and religious liberty as well as pro-family and pro-life issues. "A normal day for me involves researching and reporting education policy, coordinating conferences, or representing our schools in meetings," she said. Olivia seeks to grow in her role, serve God well, and eventually get her master's degree at Hillsdale's Van Andel Graduate School of Statesmanship.

As a freshman, Francis Bruno (Nursing '23) thought that graduation was so far in the future. "Yet here I am, starting a new chapter of my life," he added, "[with] my job in the Cardiovascular Intensive Care Unit at Baptist Hospital."

Francis requested to work in

the Intensive Care Unit for his senior preceptorship. Then after networking with other nurses and healthcare professionals, he was offered a job and accepted it. Along with invaluable skills and knowledge, Francis was equipped to acquire specific certifications. "In [NU 307] Med-Surg, we learned how to read electrocardiograms and memorize advanced cardiac life support algorithms—two areas that were vital to helping me obtain my ACLS certification," he explained. "PCC helped prepare me for this career in multiple ways."



QUALIFIED FOR GOD'S BIGGER PLANS

When Perla Zarrazola (*Medical Office Administration '23*) landed her first interview, she was ready for it. "PCC pushes you academically because they want you to be prepared once you leave," she shared. "Classes such as Business Communications

or speech have been put into practice more times than I'd like to admit." Perla gives presentations regularly as part of her new job—department administrative support for the liver transplant center at UCHealth in Denver, Colorado.

Perla's job has allowed her to travel and see new places while also continuing her education with a nursing degree. "It's been an exciting time," she said. "My schedule is more flexible now, but definitely still busy." Perla hopes to run her own clinic one day and greatly benefits from current experiences. "I didn't think I would end up working in a transplant center, but God had much bigger plans."



UNAFRAID TO BE AN ENTREPRENEUR

Sydni Kelly (Advertising/Public Relations '23), the Digital Marketing Specialist for Building Envelope Consultants Inc., feels honored to be an alumna. "PCC [challenged] me to be above average and strive for excellence," she ad-

mitted. "Dr. [Lonnie] Smith taught me to never be afraid to do something because if I make a mistake, I will still learn. He also taught me to always have integrity, and how even little things can be a testimony in the workplace."

One day, Sydni would love to have her own business; but for now, she works closely with her boss, learning what she can do in the future. Challenging undergrad classes and in-depth material helped Rachel narrow down her specific interests in biology and think critically about complex issues. Why did you choose to study the engineering: mechanical concentration program at PCC? I chose mechanical engineering because I felt and saw God's gifting in my life toward math and science. There are a few different reasons I chose PCC: first was probably the excellent legacy this institution has. Having parents and a grandparent that went here has made that very obvious. I also attended engineering camp here the summer of my junior year of high school. God used that experience and especially my camp counselor to

direct me here for mechanical engineering. What are your favorite PCC events? I really love Fine Arts. As someone in a STEM field, I really love disconnecting [from classes] for a culturally enriching event put on by my peers and seeing their talents shine. How has the Christian environment encouraged spiritual growth during your time here? I look forward to Opening Convocation each semester because of the intention and effort that is put in to refocus on what really matters. Bible Conference really helps to put things on pause partway through the semester and

remember why we are even here: to serve God while we prepare to serve Him better. Even daily chapel has been helpful, inundating us with God's Word. Can you share a time where a friend or faculty member encouraged or inspired you? I was really concerned about my grade in Calculus 3. When I talked to my professor, Mr. [Dale] Thompson, he said, "When you go to the gym, you don't get concerned about immediate results. You just put in the daily effort and be patient. It's no different with school. Put in the work each day, no matter how much is required, and be patient."

You mentioned having parents and grandparents who earned degrees from PCC. What has it been like to share college memories from the same campus? Inclined to Worry

Dear Lord, I am inclined to worry too much; tell me what to do!

What is worry? Worry comes from an Anglo-Saxon word meaning "to choke or to strangle." Worry is a destroyer and crippler of life!

There are three days in every week when you should not worry: yesterday, today, and tomorrow. I read about a man who made what he called a Wednesday Worry Box. He put a slot in the top of the box and wrote on a piece of paper anything that came to his mind about which he was going to worry, then slipped it down in the slot. He said to himself, "I will worry about that next Wednesday." When Wednesday rolled around, he opened the box and discovered that all the things had not come to pass.

A recent survey showed that ninety-two percent of everything people worry about never happens. Worry is like a rocking chair: it gives you something to do but gets you nowhere.

How does worry affect a person? Worry attacks the whole person. It reduces your level of achievement, depletes your body of strength, robs you of sleep, and causes trouble to your neck, back, legs, head, and heart. It brings on indigestion and ulcers. It stalls the engine of your life and puts your life in reverse. It wastes your body, cankers your soul, dampens your spirit, and dulls your mind. In other words, it affects you mentally, spiritually, emotionally, and physically.

There are four main causes for worry.

1. Thinking of what you do not have instead of what you do have: We spend our time thinking, "If I just had . . . If I just had . . . "

Don't spend time thinking about what you do not have and the places where you have not been. Rather, think about what you do have and where you have been. Take inventory!

"Count your blessings, name them one by one, Count your many blessings, see what God hath done!"

2. Refusing to face life as it is: Life is not a bed of roses. We have to face the reality of our lives. We must bring our burdens to the Lord and leave them there!

- 3. Centering your thoughts on yourself instead of those around you: Some people's lives are like islands—self on the north, self on the south, self on the east, and self on the west. Self, self, self—always thinking about self! Let's start thinking about others.
- 4. Failing to exercise faith in God: Faith is the victory that overcomes the world, and faith will overcome worry.

How can worry be overcome? We cannot overcome worry by using drugs, alcohol, sedatives, tranquilizers, or by making good resolutions. Deliverance from worry and having perfect peace come when we keep our minds stayed on God. "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee" (*Isa. 26:3*).

The divine prescription for overcoming worry is Philippians 4:

The right kind of **praying**: "But in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God" (*v.* 6).

The right kind of **thinking**: "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things" (v. 8).

The right kind of **living**: "Those things, which ye have both learned, and received, and heard, and seen in me, do: and the God of peace shall be with you" (v. 9).

If you pray right, think right, and live right, you will be all right. Worry is sin. If the peace of God is guarding your life, you have no reason to worry!

Dr. Raymond Barber, pastor emeritus of Worth Baptist Church in Fort Worth, Texas, is a well-known Bible Conference speaker. 

On a campus with thousands of students, collegian life can play a great role in the friendships PCC students make. The student-led organizations have been a defining feature of the student body since the inception of the College; and despite growing and changing, they've meaningfully impacted the lives of students and graduates. "It helped with having a sense of belonging," recalled Kaylee Jones (Elementary Education '10), former Phi Sigma Pirates member. "I remember looking forward to collegian meetings, making new friends, and being happy to belong to a 'club' of new people."



THE FOUR PILLARS



Together, collegian members can support and encourage each other through the Four Pillars of Greek life: Unity, Academics, Leadership, and Service. The Four Pillars were introduced in 2015 to add structure and categories to the ways members can earn points for their collegians. The Unity category promotes friendships through shared experiences such as collegian sports and outings, Academics en-

courages developing excellence through study groups, Leadership invites students to take ownership by directing projects and events, and Service assists others on campus and in the community. Collegians with the most points earn recognition, awards, and additional funds to invest back into their group.

Grant Wood (*Sr., WA*), a current lota Chi Stingrays member, appreciates how his collegian regularly provides a productive atmosphere. "At the end of the day, we are here at college to get a degree," he shared. "A lot of us encourage each other and help each other study. The biggest tool has been asking guys in my collegian who are older than me for advice about classes, teachers, and study habits."

All PCC students can grow and develop necessary skills for future careers or ministries through leadership opportunities. During her senior year, Misty Graham (*Elementary Education '04*) was president of the Chi Epsilon Timberwolves, an experience that grew her. "I had to do things I never would have done otherwise as a quiet, stand-offish person," she said. "It added more responsibility to my already hectic life but helped me grow as a person. I have been put in other leadership roles in the real world, and I am so thankful for the experience I had at PCC."

A LASTING IMPACT

One of the best parts about collegians is how they bring students together to make lasting memories and build enduring friendships. "When you join a collegian, you join something that is bigger than yourself," said Mark Ward (*General Studies '93, M.A. '17*), former Zeta Chi Hawks member. "You get to meet so many guys from different backgrounds and places. The collegian enabled me to make lasting friendships and helped me get to know other students at PCC. It was a family atmosphere—both during the collegian meetings as well as participating in extracurricular activities."

Collegians have their own personalities, but all share the same foundational purpose to provide well-rounded experiences for the student body. And as former members have shown, these memories are carried fondly long after one's college days are over. "Collegian was really about opportunity," shared Cranston Knowles (*Evangelism '93, M.S. '95, M.A. '04, Ed.S. '06*), former Alpha Omega Crusaders member. "It was a place of opportunity where even I can make a difference in the midst of a big college. College could be a place you get a degree to get a job, but being part of a small group like a collegian where you're able to play sports, create teamwork and opportunities—that is what made the college experience valuable."

Teaching students to become leaders who influence the world for Christ—this is an end goal of each faculty member across the PCC campus. Over the years, faculty have encouraged, coached, and advised students through well-prepared lessons for a variety of professional careers and ministries. In their classrooms, "ah-ha" moments become steppingstones toward the fulfillment of God's calling. Anyone in education knows that choosing to invest in students' lives takes personal sacrifice, but it's a decision that longtime PCC faculty have never regretted.





TRAINING A CHRISTIAN WORKFORCE

In 2003, Miss Chee Yum was an integrated circuit design engineer in Maine when a traveling PCC Ensemble team visited her church, inspiring her to teach at a Christian college. Since 2005, Miss Yum has been teaching electrical engineering courses, advising students, and creating and preparing lectures and lab experiments. She also tests program-level learning outcomes each semester as part of PCC's ABET accreditation. "PCC is the greatest place to work," she shared. "The people you meet and work with are godly and most importantly everyone working at PCC has one common goal-to serve God."

After they graduate, Miss Yum's students are equipped to enter their careers with a Christlike spirit and eagerness to improve. "I enjoy teaching and training my students to be Christian engineers with problem-solving skills in mind," she said. "As I have always told my students, if it is not challenging, then it is not worth doing. The more challenging a task is, the more rewarding the result."

Throughout her time here, Miss Yum has felt encouraged to continue providing the best learning experiences for her students. "I am impressed with the support that I have in my department," she explained. "I have the liberty to recommend or suggest the purchase of equipment with my [department] chair that will support my classes as well as my coworkers."

FINDING FULFILLMENT

Dr. lovce Pate has been training PCC nursing students since 1988, joining faculty after starting as an Intensive Care Unit nurse in a local Pensacola hospital. "I thought after [a 3-year contract] that I would be done with the job—here I am, 35 years later, still at PCC and loving my job!" she shared. "The dean and chair of Nursing care about me and try to assign courses that I love to teach. They often express appreciation for what I do."

Over the years, she's learned to lean on her coworkers and has appreciated support when faced with difficult moments in her life. "When I became a caregiver for my mom, they were so helpful," Dr. Pate explained. "Dean [Denise] McCollim (known for being a fabulous baker) often sends baked goods home for my mom. It's the little things that are so nice!"

And Dr. Pate has loved seeing her students go on to work in hospitals across the country and as medical missionaries around the world. "The rewards of teaching nursing students who will go out into the world and reach others for the Lord is the icing on the cake," she said. "I am so thankful the Lord placed me here."





EMBRACING THE CALL

Dr. Jonathan Sparks arrived as a computer science/software engineering student. Fast forward to 2023, he's been a computing faculty member at PCC for 15 years. "I interviewed at several different technology companies and had several opportunities available to me. However, one by one, God kept closing the door and opening the door to stay and teach at the College," he shared. "It was God's leading to open an opportunity for me to teach and to transition to be a co-laborers with the faculty who taught me."

His wife, Janae (History '10), has been staff in the PCC IT Department since 2011. They feel blessed to work in the same ministry and appreciate the on-campus childcare and Pensacola Christian Academy discount offered to PCC employee families. "It is really unique to have an organization that my whole family is a part of," said Dr. Sparks. "PCC has more families working for it than I think most workplaces. I've personally enjoyed having the whole family heading in the same direction every day, going to work/ school together, having a free lunch with my wife at work, and going home together. It's such a unique opportunity that I don't think many people get to have."

No matter the class or academic area, PCC faculty know that teaching is more than a job-it's a calling. "It's hard to understand all of the blessings God can provide when you are in His will," Dr. Sparks explained. "Seek God and He will lead."

This year, several distinctive events are taking place in the fall semester as Pensacola Christian College celebrates its 50th year of God's goodness.




