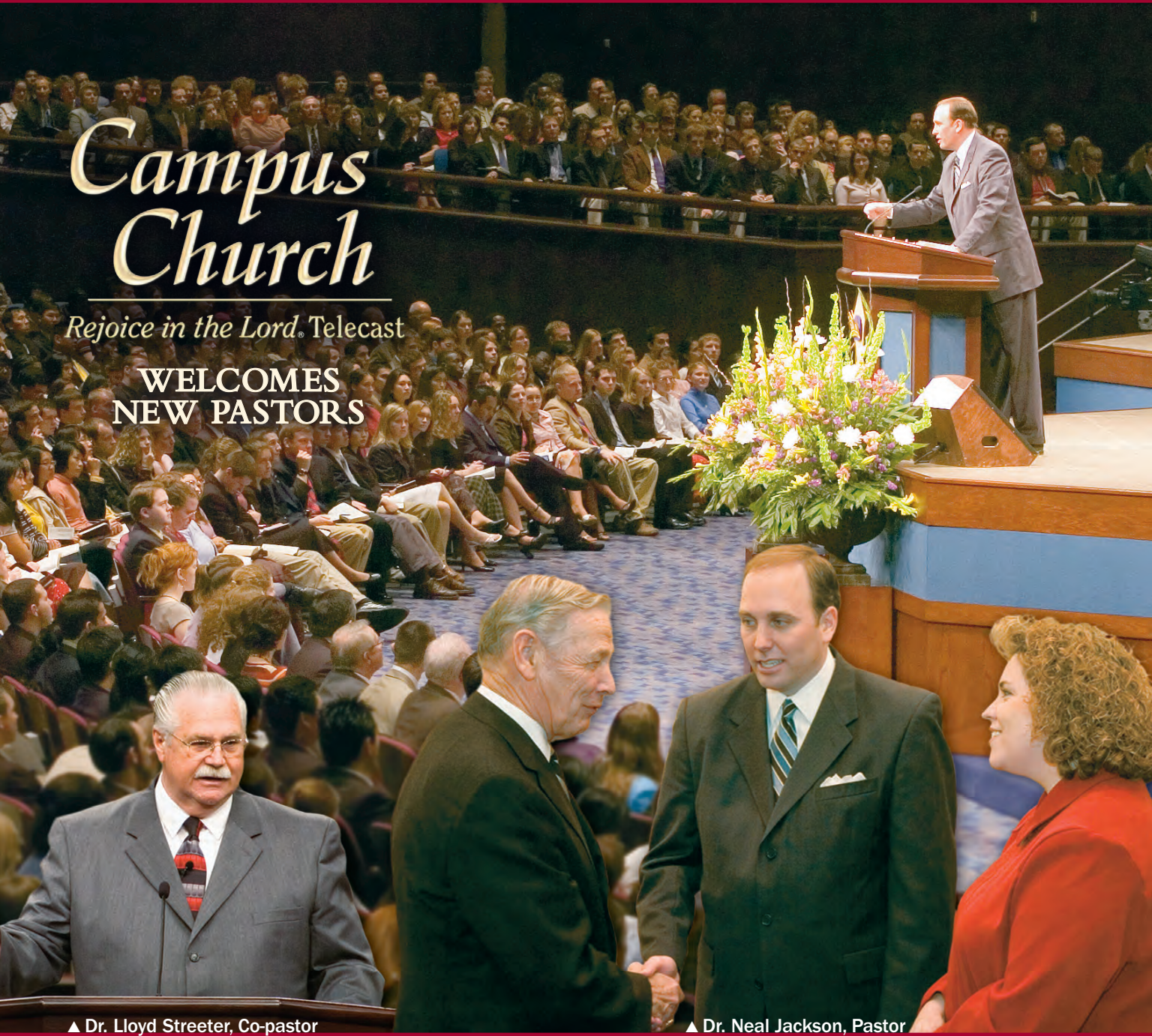

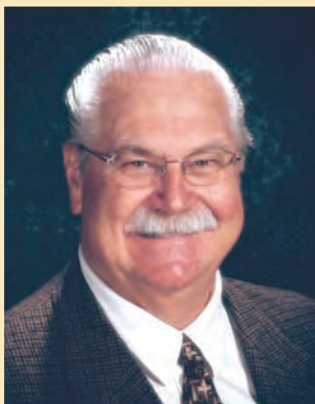

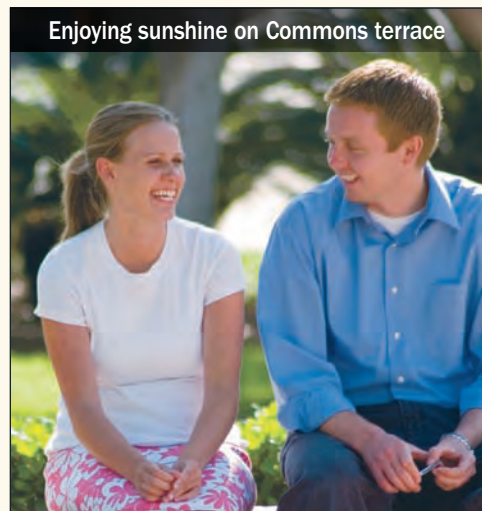

Learning to be a High School teacher— Secondary Education at PCC

“Our education programs are practical; for we concentrate on the *how-to's* of teaching,” said **Dr. Phyllis Rand**, dean of education. “Our

purpose is to train quality teachers for Christian schools.” For those wanting to teach grades 7–12, PCC offers majors in secondary education.



Matthew Scott (Sr., FL) said, “I relate to high school students, and I chose secondary education because I enjoy teaching history and

P.E. more than the other subjects—I like being a specialized teacher.” He is a history education major with a physical education second teaching field.

Secondary education students choose a primary teaching field and a second teaching field, giving them two areas of proficiency. Primary teaching fields offer students many areas to choose from—history, English, science, chemistry, biology, speech, mathematics, physical education, music, business, or Spanish.

Christian schools need teachers in other subjects, such as art or computer science; therefore, some students choose a second teaching field in these subjects. PCC offers 13 second teaching fields.

Both classroom and video observations, and peer teaching lead up to the secondary teaching internship taken senior year. Teaching Assistants (interns) are privileged to train at Pensacola Christian Academy, where they are guided by an experienced PCA advisory teacher. They spend seven weeks teaching high school students in their teaching fields.

This senior internship provides a sturdy bridge between being a col-



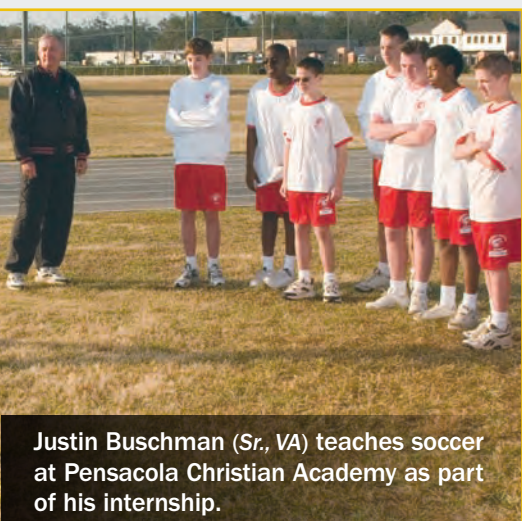


lege student and becoming a professional teacher.



Stephanie Warren ('05 grad), current PCC music education graduate student, decided to attend PCC and major in music education and math education after she attended the Summer Music Academy at PCC. She remembers her internship as, "a transitional phase that prepared me to teach my high school classes. As I taught, I learned even more about my subjects."

PCC graduates teach in Christian schools throughout the U.S. and around the world.

During his PCC years, **Ken Smith** ('99 grad) knew God called him to be a missionary, but didn't have peace about changing his major from secondary education to pastoral ministries. He said, "I see now why God didn't give me peace about changing majors, as He knew I would need the skills I learned in the secondary education program." Ken serves as pastor of Nazareth Baptist Church in Papua New Guinea, and he also is an administrator and teacher at Bethlehem Bible Institute. "I am using my secondary education training in the Institute as I teach, develop curriculum, and prepare many of my own materials. I am now training others to be teachers."



Jason Keller ('99, MA '01) serves as asst. administrator at Union Grove Christian School in Lexington, N.C. In addition to administrative duties, he teaches upper high school English and computer applications. "I have frequently heard colleagues ask, 'Where did you learn to do that?' Often my response is, 'From general teaching methods class my sophomore year,' or, 'My advisory teacher showed me that during my internship at PCA.' I could not have received better training for a ministry in Christian education than I received from PCC's secondary education program."

PCC's Bible Manuscript Room Honors the Word

Students, parents, and guests view the up-close history of the Bible when they visit the Bible Manuscript Room, which contains a collection of Bibles dating from the 16th century to the present. These Bibles are inscribed—some on animal skin and wound on a scroll, or bound with thick leather spines, or sometimes lavishly covered with felt and bound with brass hinges. The Bible Manuscript Room provides a colorful and insightful history of the Bible's preservation.

The collection contains a nearly 600-year-old Hebrew manuscript and a perfect replica of the Dead Sea Scroll of Isaiah, also 4 of Erasmus' 5 editions of the Bible, plus two original 1611 King James Version Bibles. Pensacola Theological Seminary and PCC Bible faculty frequently have class tours to teach the students the importance of the Bible's history.

"When you study the history and preservation of the Bible, it's very helpful to see this collection," said asst. library director, Steve Bazis. "This collection gives people a visual confirmation of how God preserved His Word throughout history."

For those wanting a closer look at the collection, the library reference area contains facsimile reprints of some Bibles in the collection. These facsimiles are digitally replicated versions of important historical Bibles. Students can also log on to the library's PALM system and virtually search Bibles by book and chapter, plus view other items from the collection. There are 14 cases displaying the Bible's history and preserving its beauty and integrity. ■

Pensacola Theological Seminary

Today, the Bible is attacked by the culture and undermined by intellectuals. But Pensacola Theological Seminary continues to uphold God's word as absolute truth. This academic year marks the 10th anniversary of PTS as an academic/spiritual program that hinges on the practical application of Biblical truth. From 80 students in 1998, PTS has grown to 204 students.



Chad Morgan (GA), master of divinity, is in his second year. He appreciates that "PTS is not out of touch with local ministries, and balances academic Bible instruction with prompting students to serve in

a ministry." Chad is fluent in Spanish and preaches in a Spanish ministry at a local church. He also teaches English to Spanish-speaking members after the services.



Johnny Pereira (M.Div., '03) serves as an associate pastor in Pennsylvania. He preaches, directs outreach ministries, and works with

local college students in his ministry he calls *Pathfinders*. He appreciates the quality education he received at PTS. "You can't help but notice that everything at PTS is done first-rate." He said, "I appreciate the Seminary's desire to do the best for God's glory."



David Horsford (M.Div., '01), earned a PCC business management degree and then enrolled in PTS. He says, "The focus of my studies at

PTS was on my personal relationship with Jesus Christ. PTS trained me to be a man of God rather than simply

an intellectual." He now serves as an associate pastor, youth pastor, and choir director in Colorado.

VOCAL/DRAMATIC PRODUCTIONS

open to all students

To perform and assist in dramatic productions is natural for speech majors, but what about opportunities for those enrolled in other majors? Yes, all majors can participate in Fine Arts plays and operas, smaller dramatic productions, *Vespers* programs, music concerts, and student body skits. Each semester, PCC presents a Fine Arts play or opera/opera. Auditions for these productions are open to all students and faculty. Speech and non-speech majors often have featured roles. That is also true for musical productions.

James Ridgley, Jr., ('05 grad), majored in secondary education, yet he performed in two major productions. He said, "Participating in

the Fine Arts plays helped me improve my communication skills and taught me the responsibility of working with others to achieve a goal." It also fueled ideas for his starting a school. "It showed me what I could do with my school one day." James said, "Even though productions may be written by secular authors, they can be done to give glory to God."

While many students perform in Fine Arts plays or operas, many also perform in smaller dramatic productions, which hold "open auditions" for performances.



"To be involved in productions, you do not have to be a speech major," said **Dr. Charlene Monk**, play director and speech faculty. She

recommends being a part of productions for several reasons. "It builds confidence in handling yourself in front of an audience. It also taps into imagination and creativity, and it's good for simply learning to communicate your thoughts better."



Miss Rhonda Autrey, speech faculty and performances coordinator, added another reason for getting involved, "Any student would

benefit from being in a production, because every experience they have, in addition to their major, will make them a more well-rounded person."

PCC productions offer all students the opportunity to broaden their experiences, enhance their communication abilities, and present a wholesome performance for God's glory. ■

PCC's Engineering Programs



Engineering is a challenging field. It uses God's laws of science and mathematics in making things work by designing and analyzing components like a transmission gear, or an entire car design. PCC offers two programs—**mechanical** engineering and **electrical** engineering.

Mechanical engineers select the materials, shapes, and sizes of a component to make equipment perform safely and economically.

Electrical engineers design electronic chips and components, and design software and firmware that run programs for components in cell phones, MP-3 players, ovens, microwaves, computers, GPS systems in cars, etc.

Mary Beth Lascrain (Sr., FL) is double majoring in electrical and mechanical engineering. She said, "Originally I



majoring in both to keep my options open. When it seemed too hard for me, the Lord confirmed that both degrees were His will for my life." Mary Beth has completed an engineering internship at the Oakridge National Laboratory in Tennessee, where she worked with a mentor and prepared an abstract for publication.

Her project, entitled the Heavy Truck Duty Cycle project, involved conducting research to test instrumentation in semi trucks using both mechanical and electrical engineering skills. She tested effects of engine torque, velocity, weather, fuel efficiency, and many other factors that influence how trucks perform. Mary Beth now works long distance for the laboratory as a part-time consultant helping with trouble shooting.



Joe Richello (Sr., CT) is a mechanical engineering major. During his breaks from PCC, he worked for a machine gun shop that designs bolt and carrier assembly for M16 machine guns for homeland security. One summer he worked for a concrete company, helping design pre-

cast concrete products including storm drains, dog kennels, and cement silos. Joe said, "One of my favorite PCC classes was senior design. It was hands-on and applicable to everyday situations. I appreciate how the classes work together and prepare students for the next step.

Joe continued, "Initially, I did not want to go to college. But my dad encouraged me to get a degree in mechanical engineering because I could work anywhere with that degree. Now, I wouldn't trade my education for a million dollars!"

Dr. Shane Smith, dean of basic sciences and engineering, says, "Common traits among engineering majors are the traits seen in children taking apart their mechanical toys. They have insatiable curiosity, enjoy solving problems, love math and science, and are both creative and analytical. They must obey the absolute rules of mathematics, while discovering the most efficient, creative designs for electronics and machines."

About PCC's engineering faculty, Dr. Smith said, "Our faculty are well qualified, excellent teachers who care about their students." Their qualifications range from designing cell phones to working on submarines. They have earned degrees from a variety of reputable schools across America including Purdue, University of Pittsburgh, and Naval Postgraduate School.

After graduation, most PCC engineering grads are hired straight out of college. Mary Beth said, "I feel well prepared for either graduate school or going straight to work as an engineer."

Over 200 PCC grads are employed at a variety of fields and industries including aerospace, agricultural, automotive, construction, consulting, defense, energy development, HVAC equipment and controls, and medical pharmaceutical

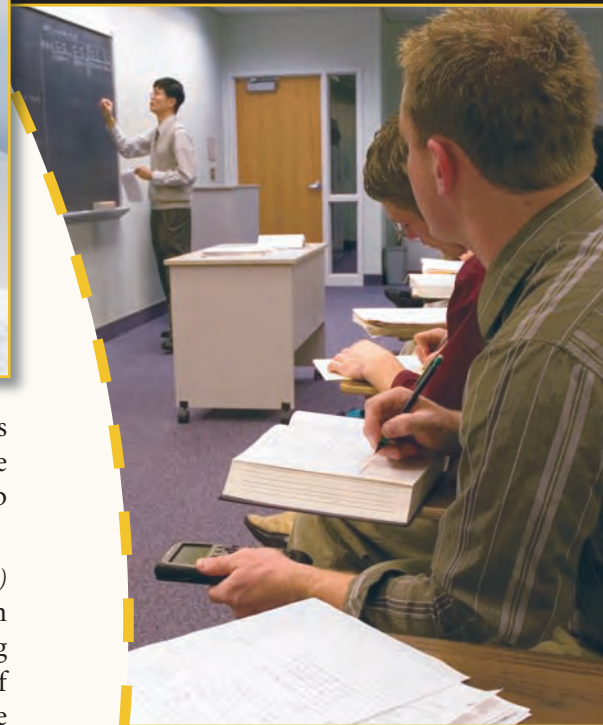

Rich Rowe ('91 grad) received a masters in mechanical engineering from Penn State University. He was then accepted into the Naval nuclear propulsion officer candidate program and became a submarine officer. Rich said, "The selection process was intensive. I spent two years training—both in fast-paced classroom situations and hands-on training, learning to operate a nuclear reactor.

"Then I spent 10 years as a submarine officer teaching officers and enlisted personnel to operate a nuclear plant. I also planned Tomahawk cruise missile missions. After leaving the military, I was hired by a Fortune 500 company, Exelon Nuclear. My first two years working there included more training toward my senior reactor operator license from the nuclear regulatory commission.

"Without PCC's sound mechanical engineering preparation, I would not have made it through the screening and training necessary for my

career. Many very intelligent grads of major universities failed to make the cut. PCC did an outstanding job teaching fundamentals."



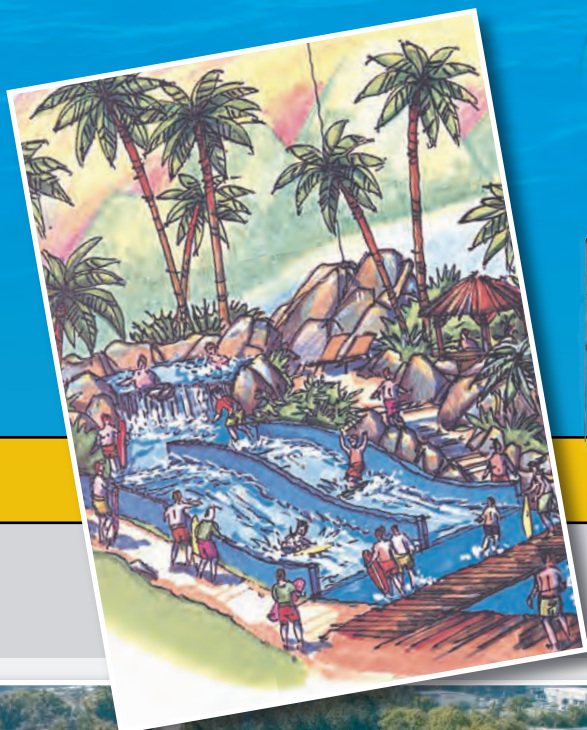
Scott Miller ('00 grad) received a masters in industrial engineering from the University of Pittsburgh in '01. He now works as a mechanical design engineer at Lockheed Martin's Space Systems Company in Sunnyvale, CA in the Solar Array and Mechanisms Product Center. Scott said, "PCC's faculty are there for one reason—service. I remember spending countless hours working with my professors, one-on-one. On the contrary, public university faculty tend to prioritize their research and funding above teaching."

PCC's qualified faculty take time to work individually with students and emphasize the basic fundamentals that students need. PCC is a great place to learn how things work. ■

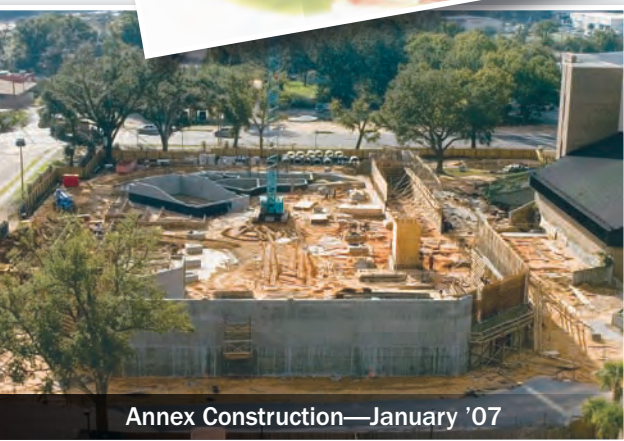

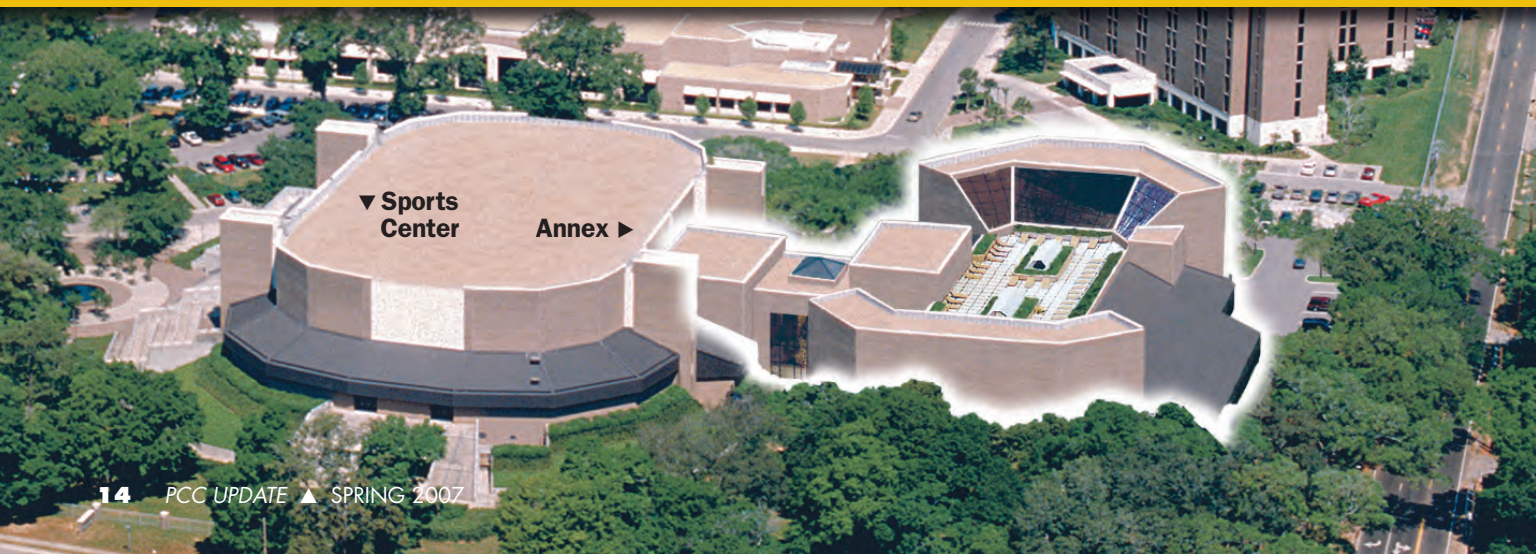
Sports Center Expansion

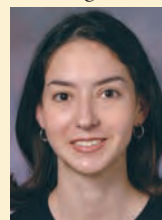

Areas of Study

Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.) Modules are offered in Jan., Mar., May, and Aug. This program is designed for those successfully engaged in ministry and builds upon an M.Div. or its equivalent.

Master of Divinity (M.Div.) The minimum M.Div. residence requirements can be completed in one year (fall / spring) with the remaining courses taken through summer sessions and one-week modules in Jan., May, and Aug.

Master of Arts in Bible Exposition (M.A.) Residence work can be completed in one-week modules, summer sessions, or year round. Complete 9 of 10 courses by distance learning.

Master of Ministry (M.Min.) Modules are offered in Jan., Mar., May, and Aug. Flexible scheduling of courses can be completed in summer sessions and one-week modules.

Master of Church Music (M.C.M.) Requirements can be completed in two summers of five sessions each. Three music sessions are offered each summer. Bible requirements may be met by attending summer sessions or one-week modules in Jan., May, or Aug. or through distance learning (9 credits).
