

bring about life. But PCC upholds the biblical creation account—God created the universe in six literal days and man in His image.



# **Evidences of Creator "Overwhelming"**

Thernher von Braun, father of U.S. space and rocket program which put men on the moon, feels it is futile to look for God through a telescope....

Von Braun said, "The evidences of a Creator are so overwhelming to me. I just can't envision this whole universe's coming into being without something like a divine will. I cannot envision the creation without the concept of a Creator."

Von Braun cited—the orbit the earth makes around the sun, and the orbit the moon makes around the earth, as examples of physical laws which are a part of creation.

"Prediction of solar eclipses, for instance, were made several hundred years ago with tremendous precision, and reproducibility of celestial motions has always inspired man greatly and made him marvel at the precision of the laws of nature.

"These laws are so precise that we have no difficulty building a spaceship to fly to the moon and can time it with the precision of a fraction of a second. The laws are there. These laws must have been laid down by Somebody." ---Wernher von Braun, Baptist Press

# Is the Earth BILLIONS of Years Old?

To this question, the several hundred members of the Bible-Science Association and the Creation Research Society say "NO." The fact is, the earth cannot possibly be even 20,000 years old and is more likely no more than 6,000 to 8,000 years old. This is a time period which fits with Bible chronology. Of course, it does not fit with the wild guesses of evolutionists.

The biology textbooks and encyclopedias have been confidently saying that man evolved about a million years ago.... If man had his beginning a million years ago, the earth would have become overcrowded with people.

In his book Biblical Cosmology and Modern Science, Dr. Henry Morris presents a formula on population growth. To achieve the present world population within 4,500 years, the approximate amount of time since the Flood, only 2.4 children per family is required, and 43 years to a generation.

To postulate that the earth's population began one million years ago is ridiculous. The earth could not contain the people. One million years would require 28,600 generations, producing a population of 10<sup>5000</sup>. Actually, not even 10<sup>100</sup> people could be crammed into the entire known universe, certainly not onto the earth.

# **Creation in 6 Literal Days**

The Hebrew word yowm (day) appears approximately 2,300 times in the Old Testament, and almost always means a literal day. When used in the plural form yamim (845 times), it always refers to a literal day. When modified by numerical or ordinal in historical narrative (359 times in the Old Testament outside of Genesis 1), it always means a literal day.

In a 1984 letter to British scholar David Watson, Dr. James Barr, Oxford University professor of Hebrew and interpretation of Scripture, states:

"Probably, so far as I know, there is no professor of Hebrew or Old Testament at any worldclass university who

does not believe that the writer[s] of Genesis 1-11 intended to convey to their readers the ideas that (a) creation took place in a series of six days which were the same as the days of twenty-four hours we now experience, (b) the figures contained in the Genesis genealogies provided by simple addition a chronology from the beginning of the world up to later stages in the biblical story, (c) Noah's Flood was understood to be world-wide and extinguish all human and animal life except for those in the ark.

Or, to put it negatively, the apologetic arguments which suppose the 'days' of creation to be long eras of time, the figures of years not to be chronological and the Flood to be merely a local Mesopotamian flood are not taken seriously by any such professors, as far as I know."

It should also be stated that many, if not most, of these world-class Hebrew scholars have less than orthodox views concerning the inspiration and authority of the Scriptures, so they cannot be accused of "imposing their views" of the Bible on their

audience. They are simply stating their professional opinions as to the plain meaning of the text.

The Hebrew word yowm (day) appears approximately 2,300 times in the Old Testament, and almost always means a literal day.

> Notice also that God (the ultimate Author) specifically stated "evening and [the] morning" six times in Genesis 1 (once for each day mentioned), so that there could be no reasonable possibility of interpreting it any other way. Also, in Exodus 20 (the giving of the Ten Commandments), the Sabbath day, which was obviously twenty-four hours long, is explained with reference to the seven days of Creation.

# Creation

"In the beginning God created..."—Gen. 1:1. Those five words, the first five words in the Bible, state the basic fact that explains the origin of the world and all that's in it.

It is, however, this very profound truth that is at the center of one of the most divisive controversies of modern times.

Creation is the product of a Creator. If you acknowledge that creation was the method of origins, then you cannot forget that there was a Creator who actually was the cause of it.

It is at this point that some people stumble. They do not want a supernatural God to have any charge of them, so they reject the idea of His existence. They declare themselves to be atheists (a belief in no God). If they can dispose of God, then it follows that there could be no creation. Since the world is obviously a reality, they are pressed to look for another explanation of origins.

# \* f f Along Comes Darwin f f

n the exact day that Abraham Lincoln was born in Hodgenville, Kentucky (Feb. 12, 1809), Charles Darwin was born in Shrewsbury, Shropshire, England.

Lincoln was a great man. He became president at age 52 and led the nation through one of its most critical eras. His influence and legacy still have a powerful impact upon the world.

At age 50 (1859), Darwin published a book entitled On the Origin of Species. In it he

made his case for an idea called evolution. Although the idea did not originate with Darwin, he defined it and gave it stature in his book.

We salute Lincoln for the impact he made upon America and the world. But not so with Darwin. Over the past 150 years his wide-spread influence has had a devastating [effect] upon the value systems of this world.

# Darwin's Hypothesis Woefully Deficient

Cince I had not read Darwin's On the Origin of Species in several years, I pulled it from my shelves last month and read it in its entirety once again.

The verbiage is extensive with page after page of his pondering and posturing. There are a few spots where it is interesting, but by and large it is a very dull, lack-luster book.

His honesty compelled him to admit that objections to his case would be raised because there were so many things for which he did not have answers. For example, he said, "Long before having arrived at this part of my work, a crowd of difficulties will have occurred to the reader. Some of them are so grave that to this day I can never reflect on them without being staggered" (p. 178).

I recommend that we all consider using the term hypothesis rather than theory when mentioning evolution. A hypothesis is a supposition or proposed explanation made on the basis of limited evidence, while a scientific theory is used as a plausible general principle or body of principles offered to explain a phenomenon.

Evolution is such a shoddy scheme that it does not deserve to be given the status of a theory. -Shelton Smith,

# Religious Discrimination

# **Against Creationists in Academia**

The writer interviewed approximately 100 persons who were either active in what is generally called creationism or who felt that the standard evolutionary paradigm was inadequate and should be balanced with an alternative position on origins. The creationists differed considerably relative to their views of origins, and many would not be identified with the 24-hour day, 6-day literal creationist position, nor accept a universal Noachian deluge, but all felt that they faced religious discrimination

in academic careers. The discrimination ranged from derogatory comments to denial of tenure or an earned degree. The writer

also reviewed extensively the literature and interviewed about a dozen academic deans and department chairs in the field of science, and all without exception felt that holding a "creationistic" stance would seriously impede one's academic career. Many openly stated that they would not hire or support the candidacy of an outof-the-closet creationist for a permanent, tenured position in academia.

Tt is now well documented that discrimi-Ination against creationists is serious and widespread. A 1979 U.S. Commission on Civil Rights report concluded that religious discrimination is widespread and little is now being done about it. Yet most civil rights or governmental agencies have done little about what has developed into a serious problem. The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) has not even published guidelines for dealing with religious discrimination. They have done little to help creationists and so far have

declined to hold public hearings on the problem.

The current guidelines deal only with reasonable accommodation (see Federal Register, Vol. 45, No. 213, 10-31-1980, pp. 72611-72615). Creationists and conservative Christians are now a persecuted minority, although often because of conflicts over specific stands, such as proselytizing in the public school classroom.

Little if any effort has been expended to

enforce the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which outlaws discrimination based on religion (p. 29, Section 703). It is a law which now ex-

ists more on paper than fact. As Roberts concludes:

America has a new bigotry. Traces of it have been lying around for a long time, glimpsed only fleetingly and in widely scattered places. But in 1983, it assumed nationwide proportions. This is bigotry against evangelicals.

Two things are particularly frightening about this bigotry. Few recognize it, and nobody [has so far done] anything about it. It is difficult to say which is more disturbing.

Any religious group that defies public opinion and practices nonconformity runs the risk of ridicule and rejection. This can quickly turn to persecution in time of crisis, particularly if such persecution is advantageous to those in power.



hat makes an effective ministerial program? Balanced preparation for future ministry—which includes Bible-intensive classroom instruction coupled with personal church ministry. PCC's church internship program helps ministerial students apply Bible instruction to service in local churches, which builds a foundation for their future ministry.



Pastoral major Scott Albright (Sr., TX) said, "The internship program is a blessing that balances the academic side of my prepa-

ration. Each week, as I put my studies to use, I get recharged at the same time. My internship helps develop my purpose and encourages me to work hard and stay focused on what I am learning in classes."

Scott's internship helped him understand how churches function. He said, "My internship showed me how churches operate and gave me an additional perspective to my home church." Interns learn how to plan Sunday/Wednesday services, baptismal and communion services, organizational details, and support ministries, as ushering and nursery.

Ministerial students serve in over 30 local churches throughout a school year, and in dozens of churches across America during the summer. Seasoned pastors invest time and experience giving instruction and encouragement.

As ministerial students observe pastors who model faithfulness to God's Word, they develop genuine respect for and lifelong relationships with their mentors. A local pastor shared his appreciation for the many times former interns call or visit. He said, "It encourages me as a pastor, knowing our church had a small part in their lives and future ministries."

Youth ministries major Curtis Guest (Sr.,

FL) said, "Through a church internship, I saw the peopleside of ministry and used my Bible training in serving others."



Through preaching sermons, teaching Sunday School, visiting door-to-door, conducting neighborhood Bible clubs, or ministering in nursing homes,—interns develop a servant mindset while serving God and others.

Click and Ride—Web application to match drivers and riders traveling home at the end of semester.

**ePalms Grille**—Online ordering system allowing students to order from the Palms Grille campus restaurant.

**Infinity Books**—Web application for students to post and sell used textbooks among the student body.

With these high-interest projects, the team works diligently and with excitement. "The team stays motivated because they write programs that could help make student life

easier," said computer science faculty **Mike Geary** ('94 grad). "I try to make the courses as 'real-world' as possible, so students can

step out of the classroom into a business and contribute from day one."

When the year begins, Mike interviews each student for leadership positions, then "hires" to meet needs. "On the first day of class, I give students orientation packets as if they were employees," he said. "This is their opportunity to apply what they've learned over 3 years and put it all together."

The team calls themselves Software Engineers, Inc., and works together much like a real company. This includes promoting the Expo with posters, buttons, invitations, and chapel announcements.





# Engineering Projects Take Flight


PCC's annual Engineering Design Competition challenges student teams to design, build, test, and showcase original vehicles based on predetermined specifications.

This year's teams designed **radio-controlled gliders**, while past teams have built model-sized speedboats, submarines, hovercraft, amphibious, and ice vehicles.

Open to **electrical** and **mechanical engineering** majors (*Fr.*–*Sr.*), the competition helps students apply what they've learned in the classroom. "The competition challenged our practical knowledge

As the competition began, students, faculty, and guests gathered on College Field to watch teams prepare launching mechanisms and finish assembling the gliders. Engineering faculty judged the gliders in 3 categories—time in the air, speed, and accuracy.

Mechanical engineering faculty **Dr. Robert McLaughlin** advises students for the competition. He

said, "I was very impressed with the winning design. The team used state-of-the-art



engineering principles to design their glider and conducted thorough research and considerable testing."




