Commencement is a tradition, both solemn and celebratory. Each May, the Pensacola Christian College graduating class gathers in the Crowne Centre to recognize this milestone. Nearly 800 students crossed the stage this year, each one with a unique story. They arrived years ago as hopeful freshmen, and they left campus, degree in hand, as young men and women ready to influence their world for Christ. Beyond the ceremony was assurance: the promise had been fulfilled.

In higher education today, promises are plentiful, and it can seem like fulfillment is rare. Vision statements are polished; branding is sophisticated. But far too often, what students find once enrolled does not match what they were told. At PCC, we've chosen a different path, one paved by mutual trust.

Since 1974, PCC has prioritized core values: offering an excellent education based on the biblical worldview, while providing an incredible experience and keeping costs as low as possible. In recent years, we've become more intentional about solidifying what we have always practiced into words

we can live by—the PCC Promise. The promise rests on a foundational mission: empowering leaders to influence the world for Christ. And this May, it remained strong.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE: WHERE RIGOR MEETS PURPOSE

Excellence never occurs accidentally or without effort. At PCC, academics are about thoughtfully and skillfully preparing every student for what comes next. PCC faculty, experts at their craft and lifelong learners, go beyond just instructing. They take the time to invest in their students. They model humility and scholarship. They use every lecture, every lab, and every exam as a chance to shape intellects and lives.

And the fruit of that labor was evident this year. Students graduated as thinkers and problem-solvers, communicators and servants—individuals prepared to lead purposefully and competently. We often hear from alumni that their training at PCC

was a key component to their success in their current field. They praise the faculty, the Bible-based curriculum, and sometimes even the difficulty of the material!

This is the aim of academic excellence: to go beyond informing and to prepare students for their next step. Within a year of graduation, approximately 93.7% of PCC alumni report they are employed or enrolled in graduate programs, ready for what's next.¹

BIBLICAL WORLDVIEW: THE FOUNDATION OF TRUTH

At PCC, the Bible is the foundation of everything we do, from how we teach to what we value. The biblical worldview is woven into every discipline, from chemistry to business, art to education; students are taught to see God's truth as the framework for all knowledge.

This generation faces a barrage of conflicting messages about truth, identity, morality, and meaning. The ability to think biblically

and live faithfully is essential. Yet, the broader cultural landscape reveals a concerning trend. According to a 2023 report by the Cultural Research Center at Arizona Christian University, only 4% of Americans possess a biblical worldview.² Among those under 30, that number drops to just 1%.³ Even among self-identified bornagain Christians, only 13% hold a biblical worldview.⁴

We recognize the urgency of this reality. Chapel services, classroom discussions, and moments of discipleship within the residence halls aren't isolated events—they're purposeful, allowing for organic spiritual maturity. Knowing the right answers isn't enough; students learn to ask the right questions and seek those answers from the Word of God.

By focusing every aspect of life through the lens of Scripture, we're equipping students with knowledge and cultivating discernment, character, and a steadfast commitment to truth. PCC alumni are prepared to navigate a relativistic world with conviction and purpose.

INCREDIBLE EXPERIENCE: A VIBRANT CAMPUS AND COMMUNITY

Come to campus on any given day, and you'll observe conversations between friends about that morning's chapel message, collegian members meeting to plan a service project, or intramural sports teams gearing up for a game. There's an energy in the air and the feeling of belonging that urges students to get involved.

This year, PCC recorded the highest level of voluntary student participation in Christian Service. More than ever before, students stepped out into churches, neighborhoods, senior centers, and ministries across the greater Pensacola area. They gave time, heart, and testimony to those in need.

THE ABILITY TO THINK BIBLICALLY AND LIVE FAITHFULLY IS **ESSENTIAL**

None of this is accidental. We're dedicated to providing students with genuine community. Not the kind you scroll through, but the kind you walk alongside. The kind that laughs with you, prays with you, and calls you to be more than you thought you could be. The facilities are excellent, and the life within is extraordinary.

UNMATCHED COST: AFFORDABILITY FOR TODAY

In today's educational landscape, students and their families brace themselves for years of debt. A report from the Education Data Initiative revealed that the national average annual cost of tuition and room and board at an in-state public university is \$35,248, while the average federal student loan debt per borrower in the United States is approximately \$39,075. Many graduates spend more than 20 years repaying those loans.⁵

But at PCC, we believe a quality Christian education should be within reach. The average student pays just over \$15,000 for tuition, fees, and room and board thanks to institutional underwriting. The Work Assistance Program enables students to earn up to \$8,400 annually. Scholarships and the Fourth Year Tuition-Free program further reduce financial burdens.

At a time when student loan debt burdens much of America, PCC offers families peace of mind and a clear pathway forward. We are committed to equipping students for life and ministry and removing unnecessary financial burdens in the process. And the results are clear—approximately 79% of PCC students graduate debt-free.

THE LEGACY THAT POINTS FORWARD

As I stood on the Crowne Centre platform this May, shaking hands with each graduate, I saw more than academic achievement. I saw answered prayers. I saw students who arrived unsure of themselves and left ready to take their next step. I saw the mark of faithful faculty, prayerful parents, and a gracious God.

The PCC Promise—academic excellence, biblical worldview, and incredible experience at an unmatched cost—isn't flashy, but it is firm. And the fruit is evident: graduates stepping into classrooms, pulpits, hospitals, and offices, confident in their preparation, committed to their calling, and rooted in their faith.

In a world that is constantly shifting, there is something reassuring about an institution that remembers who we are and remains steadfast in a mission that began so long ago.

FROM CLASSROOM TO CAREER

How PCC Students Are Learning from Experts and Making an Impact

At Pensacola Christian College, academic excellence is more than a goal—
it's a journey shaped by real-world experiences, mentorship from industry professionals,
and a commitment to the biblical worldview. Across campus and beyond, students are
engaging in forums, seminars, clubs, internships, and in-field learning opportunities that
prepare them to influence the world through their chosen fields.

SPOTLIGHT ON PROGRAMS

Throughout the academic divisions, PCC students are discovering that excellence in the classroom naturally extends into opportunities beyond it. The following stories showcase the vision of PCC academics in action, where students move from in-class preparation to purpose found through internships, practicums, or full-time work.

VISUAL ARTS

When she was a senior, Clara Hansen (*Studio Art '25*) met the director of the National Naval Aviation Museum, Pensacola, FL, during Portfolio Day, an on-campus event where students present their work to artists for constructive feedback and networking. As a result of this connection, Clara was hired to illustrate a book for the museum.



"One major thing I'd like to share to future students is to not underestimate how important connections are and [to have] a firm education in the foundations," Clara said. "While at school I realized this principle on a grand scale because of the opportunities it opened up. I was able to work with Answers in Genesis to

co-illustrate a children's book published through the National Naval Aviation Museum because of the people I met along the way at Career Fairs, art clubs, and Portfolio Day."

In spring 2025, visual arts students also benefited from a weekend with renowned fine artist Daniel Keys, who led a forum, demonstration, and gallery opening, and offered one-on-one feedback and faculty collaboration.

PERFORMING ARTS

Music students have various opportunities to perform in concerts, Fine Arts Series, and even at Carnegie Hall. World-renowned Christian composer, arranger, and orchestrator Heather Sorenson (*Music '97*) invited PCC's Chamber Choir to perform with her in November 2024 and again this November. Last spring Sarah Wu (*Music Education '25*), Roman Massey (*So., TN*), and Evvie Lipskoch (*Music '25*) placed in the Gulf Coast Steinway Competition, earning an incredible opportunity to perform at Carnegie Hall this year as well.

NURSING

With clinicals starting early in the nursing program, students are gaining hands-on experience in real healthcare settings. The in-depth training frequently leads alumni to fill leadership roles. Today, alumnus Sarah Amole (*Nursing '07, M.S.N. '09*) serves in management at Sacred Heart Hospital, Pensacola, FL, exemplifying the excellence PCC nurses bring into the field.





"One of my favorite things about PCC is being part of the alumni network—specifically the nursing alumni group," Sarah shared. "It has been wonderful to interact with past graduates who are working and serving all over the world and being able to celebrate accomplishments together or reach out for help/questions related to our professions."

EDUCATION

Faculty with decades of classroom experience teach students how to use curriculum and develop effective teaching methods. Students gain valuable experience observing, through peer teaching, and by taking multiple teaching-methods courses before completing their semester-long internship at Pensacola Christian Academy. By the time a student graduates from the education program, they have accumulated up to 500 or more hours of real teaching experience.

Principal at Grace Christian Academy, Knoxville, TN, Anthony Lamb (*Physical Education '87*) found the experience he gained while student-teaching and observing at Pensacola Christian Academy most valuable. "These real-world opportunities gave me a clear and practical understanding of what to expect. Many of the methods and strategies I observed back then continue to influence my work today, even as technology and tools evolve."

IN-FIELD LEARNING AND INTERNSHIPS

Learning at PCC extends far beyond the classroom. Clubs and classes regularly take field trips to engage with professionals in action. Many of these opportunities are facilitated by alumni who are seeking to invest in the next generation of PCC students. Students also participate in internships and practicums that provide exceptional experience and open doors to future careers. Through forums, seminars, and student-led clubs, students gain firsthand insights into their fields while building meaningful connections with those who have walked the same halls and now lead in their industries.



Members of the PCC IEEE branch took a field trip to the Institute of Human and Machine Cognition to tour the facilities and explore projects in process.



At a recent cybersecurity seminar on campus, Navy officers from NAS Corry Station gave insight on the digital battlefield from the front lines, applicable for both military and civilians.



Internships at local churches provide personal mentorship and prepare graduates for fulltime positions in churches across the country.

Whether it's the Ministerial Seminar led by an experienced pastor or a Q&A session with a leading field expert after an academic forum, students are consistently exposed to ideas that blend professional expertise with spiritual depth.

POST-GRADUATE SUCCESS

For students who want to continue their studies after earning a bachelor's, PCC offers clear pathways to graduate education. Over 200 graduates stay to earn their master's degrees here for free, simultaneously gaining valuable professional experience.

Many other alumni who have completed a business, engineering, humanities, natural sciences, or performing arts degree have been accepted into prestigious graduate programs at institutions such as Auburn University, Boston University, Florida State University, Notre Dame, Texas A&M, The Ohio State University, Vanderbilt, and Wake Forest.

PCC holds an articulation agreement with the University of West Florida providing a streamlined option for a master of accountancy, while partnerships with Cedarville, Union, Southwest Baptist University, and Regent University have open doors for students pursuing pre-med, pre-physical therapy, and pre-law programs. These collaborations, combined with PCC's record of 370+ graduate school placements nationwide, ensure that students are well-prepared to advance in their fields.

CAREER READINESS THROUGH PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Throughout the academic journey, students move from theory to practice while building the skills and connections they'll need beyond graduation. Career Services plays a vital role by offering résumé coaching, mock interviewing practice, and career preparation seminars. The Career Services team sponsors recruitment events which include Career Fair, Health Professions Career Fair, and Educator Recruitment. Regent Law comes to host LSAT workshops, discuss the law school application process, and conclude with a dinner with law school representatives. Multiple other recruiters and ministries present their opportunities in the Commons Display Room.

Countless successful alumni are prepared to share wisdom, career insight, and encouragement with today's students and have access to the online Alumni Connect Mentorship Program. Students gain a mentor who has walked their path and can help them prepare for what comes next. In addition, this platform gives access to over 1,500 registered employers.

Graduates enter the world equipped to be skilled professionals who are committed Christians, prepared to carry the light of Christ into their chosen fields. For that reason, ministry isn't separated from academics but is woven into every discipline.

From the hours of music rehearsals in the practice rooms to performing at Carnegie Hall, from clinical rotations in area hospitals to medical mission fields, PCC students are learning from the best and preparing to serve with Christlike excellence. Having a foundation rooted in Scripture and a network of experienced alumni and professionals guiding the way, the journey from classroom to career is one of purpose, preparation, and influence.





A FOUNDATION THATIASTS

Building the Biblical Worldview at PCC

WHAT IS A WORLDVIEW?

A worldview can be simply stated as internal beliefs that dictate how one interacts with the external world. Every person has a worldview, regardless of whether they understand it or consistently practice it, and one's worldview influences how they interpret and react to life. New ideas, ethical dilemmas, relationships, spirituality, and even political matters are all evaluated through the framework of one's current beliefs. It is critical, therefore, for a believer to evaluate and interact with the world according to the truth of the Bible. A worldview that is distinctly biblical will not only honor the Lord, but it will equip the believer to navigate the complex issues with clear convictions and principles.

So then, what exactly is a biblical worldview? There are many worldviews that are not founded upon the truths of Scripture, such as Islam, Hinduism, eastern mysticism, and atheism. It is also common for individuals to construct their own patchwork of beliefs consisting of elements from many different perspectives. Any worldview, whether it follows a formal system or is personally assembled, must answer the most fundamental questions confronting humanity. Where did we come from? Why are we here? What is wrong with the world? How do we fix things? Christians answer these questions by means of the metanarrative of the Bible, that is, the overarching story of Scripture and the provided truths that govern reality. Those truths can be summarized as creation, corruption, redemption, and restoration.

Where did we come from and why are we here? The self-existent God created man to glorify Him and to enjoy a love-relationship with Him. This is the story of creation.

What is wrong with the world? God created man as freewill creatures, those creatures chose to reject God, and now those creatures are suffering the consequences of a corrupted existence. This is the story of corruption.

How do we fix things? Man can be redeemed and transformed by personal faith in Jesus Christ, and one day God will restore all of creation to what He originally intended. This is the story of redemption and restoration.

These truths, which proceed from the metanarrative of the Bible, comprise the biblical worldview and affect how the believer conducts himself in every aspect of life. Pensacola Christian College strives to instill this worldview in the hearts and minds of students as they prepare for the profession or ministry to which God has called them.

People at PCC are encouraged to dive deeper into their personal studies of Scripture. Started by students nearly a decade ago, Overflow—a Tuesday night Bible study—is continuing to champion the initiative for students to gather together and examine the fundamentals of what is taught at PCC, strengthening their biblical worldview. During the spring 2025 semester, Ken Ham, CEO of Answers in Genesis, visited PCC to present "Living in Babylon." 12 Fall '25

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

Why is instilling the biblical worldview so important to PCC? First, college is a place to not only learn important skills but to think important thoughts. God is deeply concerned with the content of what each of us contemplate, because it is what ultimately drives our behaviors. Philippians 4:8 instructs us to fill our minds with things that are true, honest, just, pure, lovely, virtuous, and praiseworthy. Promoting that kind of thinking is the responsibility of every discipline at PCC. It is easy to see the importance of thinking from the biblical worldview in ministry programs, but professionals and participants in every field need to "think God's thoughts" and apply them to their individual context. We want each of our students to positively influence their world for Christ, whether in the workplace, at home, or in their churches. That starts with thinking and operating out of the biblical worldview. Every person in every place has those fundamental questions referenced above, so every one of our students must be equipped to provide the answers given in the Word of God.

EVERY PERSON HAS A WORLDVIEW, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER THEY UNDERSTAND IT

The biblical worldview is also important to us at PCC for the timeliness of our opportunity. While the influence of parents and home are foundational to a person's perspective, it is in those transitional years from home to independence that one truly begins to personalize and apply the worldview they've been taught. They are exposed to new ideas and new ways of living, and these years chart a course for the rest of life. It is vital that the "course corrections" a person makes at this crucial juncture align them more with Scripture rather than less, so the influences matter. There are many places to get an education, but far fewer where the biblical worldview established at home will be reinforced and cemented in their hearts, minds, and actions. At PCC, our desire is to see each person



conformed to the image of Christ and aligned with His plans, purposes, and perspectives. No matter their field of study, it matters that your young people are exposed to truth and the biblical values that bring about positive change.

HOW IS IT IMPARTED?

The importance of PCC's commitment to the biblical worldview is evident in many ways. For us, this is not an afterthought nor something that we just wish would happen. We undertake it passionately, prayerfully, and purposely. First, a core curriculum has been carefully structured, with all students pursuing a bachelor's degree earning a biblical studies minor as part of completing their degree. Courses such as Old and New Testament Introduction, Bible Doctrines I and II, Worldview and Apologetics, and Origins guide the students from the fundamentals of the faith to the defense of their beliefs.

Another intentional step is PCC's hosting of a Worldview Lecture Series during two consecutive chapel days each semester. For example, in spring 2025 founder of Answers in Genesis, Ken Ham, helped us to the see the importance of holding to a consistently biblical worldview. Others like attorney Josh Hershberger and The

Truth Project author Del Tackett have also challenged our campus community in previous lecture series.

Furthermore, in each of our more than one thousand courses offered throughout our multiple departments, faculty members have specifically identified the worldview tenets that are supported by that course. This process ensures that all of our classes contribute intentionally to a consistent biblical perspective. The faculty's commitment to this is ongoing: just this past February, a professional development session was held for our faculty on "How to Integrate the Biblical Worldview in Your Classes." This valuable session consisted of a panel of faculty members from different departments who shared suggestions and strategies on how to do this most effectively with our students.

Additionally, each year an anonymous survey is administered to our students regarding their commitment to the biblical worldview. It is a comprehensive instrument that measures a student's beliefs, how those beliefs affect their behavior. and their basic heart-orientation. Since it is given both to students starting their college career and those nearing graduation, it allows us to compare results so that we can identify areas that may need extra attention. Students come to us having received some Christian worldview training in their homes, Christian schools, and churches. We are privileged to come alongside these young people, partnering with their parents and pastors, to reinforce and refine what they have already been taught.

Pensacola Christian College sees it as a vital part of our mission to see our students grounded in the biblical worldview. Both in and out of the classroom, in every concentration and discipline, this desire is embedded into our very culture. You can be confident that the biblical worldview is not simply a motto for us. It is a responsibility we take seriously, as a stewardship from the Lord, and it's part of our commitment and promise to you.

MORE THAN A DIPLOMA

How PCC Students Discover Growth, Community, and Calling

Today's Pensacola Christian College students have more opportunities than ever to shape their education. While earning degrees, many students also discover growth, community, and calling. The College is committed to supporting these journeys by offering an incredible experience. At graduation, students carry away not only their diploma but also a wealth of memories—meeting others during their first days on campus, building lasting community, and growing spiritually through work and service.

Graduation is just the beginning, and this life-shaping experience offers alumni a foundation for faithful lives beyond college.

INTEGRATION

Starting college in a new place can be both exciting and overwhelming. I remember stepping onto PCC's campus in the fall of 1989—unsure of what awaited me, knowing only a couple of people and feeling daunted by the energy and activity. Over time, I adjusted, found my way, and made lasting friendships.

Today, students who are beginning their PCC journey are greeted by an entire crew of campus leaders who are ready to assist. During Welcome Weekend, upperclassmen, roommates, and residence assistants pitch in, helping new students unload their cars, find their residence halls, and navigate their first few days. Students also have opportunities to make friends while enjoying games and refreshments at New Student Connections. These events helped Lee Rolston (*So., KY*) find community right away. "The activities were fun and welcoming, and the leaders went out of their way to make sure new students felt included. It helped me build friendships and gave me confidence that PCC was going to be a place where I could belong."

Students are also introduced to campus social groups and service opportunities at Greek Rush and Christian Service Expo. In a full circle ex-

perience, Cammie Spicer (*Jr., WV*) was welcomed by collegians in her freshman year and now helps greet new students. "Greek Rush was a fun time getting to see what Greek life was like in my freshman year," she shared, "As a junior, Greek Rush was filled with decorating, planning, and building energy. This year, I was able to talk to many freshmen and answer some of their questions about campus life!"

Between these fun events, students also have opportunities to worship Christ and commit themselves to Him during chapel services. They experience Opening Convocation, a powerful gathering in the Crowne Centre filled with music, prayer, preaching from God's word, and encouragement from Dr. Shoemaker. In moments like these, students realize they are part of something greater than themselves: the PCC community.

CONNECTION

As the excitement of Welcome Weekend settles, students begin weaving the relationships that often define their PCC experience. Friendship doesn't just happen in passing—it grows as roommates share everyday life, offering encouragement through long days and laughter in late-night conversations.







Relationships deepen as students cheer side by side at games, face challenges together in class projects, or pray with one another. Bonds are forged in the moments of celebrating a win, working through a difficult lab assignment, or sharing testimonies during a collegian or prayer group meeting. "I've made friends through collegians, and their majors range from youth ministries to chemistry," said Matt Ritchey (*Sr., PA*). "We're able to challenge each other spiritually and grow closer because of those shared times."

Community often grows stronger as relationships multiply and overlap. A friendship that starts in class may carry over to intramural teams; a bond formed during Greek Week could grow through shared ministry opportunities. "The more friendships you have, the smaller your world becomes," said Cammie. "Through the connections I made as a new student, I met my best friends and my [current] roommate. Later, playing collegian sports opened the door to even more amazing, God-honoring friendships that I know will continue after college."


DEVELOPMENT

Beyond building strong friendships, one of the greatest needs of college students is personal development. There are many employment and leadership roles at the college that can help students grow into the people God intends them to be. Clara Curtman (*Sr., MO*) chose to work on campus to not only fund her tuition but also grow in responsibility. "I have benefitted from getting to work with a team and seeing how each little job is important and can make a big difference when it is done well," Clara shared. "I am constantly reminded that all I do should be for God's glory—for work, school, and life."

Students can also step into leadership roles in residence halls, prayer groups, collegians, or even as class or student body officers. After jumping into campus life during her first semester, Cammie has been able to lead



both as a collegian officer and as a student body vice president. "I will never be able to fully list every aspect I've grown from freshman year to now," she shared. "I learned that a great leader washes the feet of those under them, just like Jesus washed the disciples' feet. I also learned that leadership means learning the balance of correcting and encouraging."



EMPOWERMENT

While employment and leadership roles help students grow in responsibility, ministry opportunities encourage them to live empowered Christian lives. Students may serve in Christian Service groups, the community event Serve Pensacola, summer missions' trips, and Youth Outreach Ministry camps. These activities have helped junior Kristen Kook (*MI*) to grow spiritually. "PCC is preparing me for

a lifetime of service by providing numerous opportunities to serve and lead right now!" Kristen shared. "Whether it's being a Christian service leader and getting to reach the community, getting involved in church, or even being a Prayer Leader, there is always somewhere that you can serve."

Students can get involved in 66 Christian Service groups—these include Bible clubs, music ministries, nursing home visitation, and many others. Lee has stepped forward to lead a Bible club, and he has enjoyed following in the footsteps of the group's previous members. "A huge moment in my Bible club was when one of the boys that had been coming for years finally accepted Christ as his Savior. It was amazing to be able to see the fruit of the labor of others before me," Lee said.

Lee has also served in Youth Outreach Ministry camps. Each summer, more than 200 students help make these camps a success as they disciple campers, share the gospel, and build their appreciation for service. "[Camps] taught me that service to God

is the most rewarding thing that can be done. It also taught me that service to God can be done in anything, no matter how small," Lee shared.

With all these options, any interested student can easily get involved. Bethany Teis (*So., NV*) shared how she has grown through serving. "Service opportunities have taught me skills like public speaking, time management, and thinking. PCC provides so many areas for one to grow in all aspects of one's life," Bethany said.

LIVING FAITHFULLY BEYOND COLLEGE

The PCC experience empowers students to form enduring friend-ships, grow through work and service, and become anchored in their walk with Christ. When they finally reach the long-awaited milestone of graduation, many can celebrate far more than earning a degree: they recognize growth, perseverance, and God's faithfulness. "PCC has stretched me and grown me in ways that I would not have grown if I attended a different college. Pensacola Christian College is truly teaching me how to influence my world," said Bethany.

As students hear the trumpet fanfare and don their cap and gown at Commencement, they reflect on their accomplishments while looking to the future. They have successfully completed college and received tools they can use to lead lives that count for Christ. The PCC experience does not end with Commencement, and a graduate's success is not defined by only passing grades or landing a job. True success is when alumni finish college prepared to serve others, teach others about Christ, and live faithfully. Personally, I am deeply grateful that God used PCC in my life to prepare me for leadership and service. That is what makes the PCC experience truly incredible.



PASSING A LEGACY FORWARD

Alumni Engagement

There are moments in the life of an institution when its present converges with its past in a way that points unmistakably toward the future. Pensacola Christian College is in such a moment. With the articulation of the PCC Promise—a clear, enduring statement of what the College does—alumni now stand at the threshold of a new era.

For just over 27,000 graduates, the Promise is not a slogan or passing initiative. It is the embodiment of what they themselves once lived: truth taught without compromise, servants trained with diligence, excellence pursued in every field, affordability preserved as a matter of stewardship, and Christ honored above all. Alumni are witnesses to this legacy, and many are becoming partners in ensuring it flourishes for those who will walk the campus in years to come.

WHERE THE PROMISE TAKES ROOT

The Promise appears in ordinary places every day. You see it when a nurse steadies a patient, a pastor opens Scripture, a lawyer speaks for the voiceless, an engineer designs a boat, a judge weighs the law, and parents teach truth at home. The setting changes. The formation remains constant.

Preparation sits at the center. Its rhythm class after class, paper after paper—was not dramatic, but endured. Lori Antkoviak (*Pre-Law '00*) recalls the drills that formed her craft. "The English and grammar classes along with the business law practice of writing legal briefs provided the basics of legal writing," she said. "Because of the practice and variety of classes [at PCC], I felt better prepared than many other law school students that had only majored in political science or history." That foundation carried her

to law school, a clerkship, practice, and now leadership at Safe Harbor Children's Advocacy Center in Michigan.

The arts tell the same story. Darrin Crow (*Speech '94*) found in PCC's Fine Arts productions more than performance—he found a cultural formation that continues to shape his work. "The ability to communicate well is a vital skill that can open doors in many career fields," he explained. Now serving as education coordinator at Ushers Ferry Historic Village in lowa, he draws on those experiences daily as he teaches history through story.

Preparation at PCC is joined to the biblical worldview that guides decisions beyond the classroom. Jonathan Stormer (*Bible '03, Evangelism '05*), now a U.S. Army captain and physician at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, put it plainly: "I further developed a biblical worldview while teaching high school Bible for three years in Maine and real-

ized Christian service encompasses all aspects of life, so I returned to pursuing a ministry through medicine." His journey reminds us that Christian service belongs in exam rooms and laboratories as much as it does in pulpits.

That worldview is reinforced by time in chapel and in community life. As Josh Hershberger (*Political Science '08*) said in a Pre-Law Forum, "It is a grand adventure. Four years of chapel and getting the worldview before going into the fire. Yes, you are leaving mom and dad, but PCC helps train you in a safe environment before you are thrown into the fire."

ALUMNI SHAPING STUDENTS TODAY

Alumni do more than model the Promise. They extend it. Jordana Coppola (*Management '95*) has guided seniors preparing for interviews and first jobs, sharing lessons that only experience can teach, and

Pastor Matt Teis (*Pastoral Ministries '00*) fulfills Scripture by training young men through the summer internship program at Liberty Baptist Church in Las Vegas, where he is the lead pastor. "Education and experience are the two essentials of ministerial training," he said. "PCC provides both in the classroom and through partnership with alumni pastors across the country."

Each act may seem small, but together they form a pattern of influence—quiet, consistent, and strong enough to shape the next generation. And their influence does not stop at mentorship. It deepens through stewardship.

STRENGTHENING THE PROMISE TOGETHER

The PCC Promise endures not only through faculty and leadership but also because alumni choose to strengthen it in practical ways. Their mentorship offers timely help that no textbook can provide. Their gifts to scholarships and the PCC Cares Fund lighten the load for students who might otherwise step away. When they return for Homecoming, they do more than revisit memories. They show students that the work of college has lasting worth. Many extend the Promise further by hiring graduates and by sharing simple testimonies of faith and perseverance. In each case, the impact of a PCC education is measured in lives, not statistics.

History offers perspective. Alumni remember chapel that ordered the day, rehearsals

that built discipline, and course loads that demanded planning. They also remember the cost and the relief of help that arrived in time. Affordability at PCC has always been a deliberate choice that requires careful stewardship and generosity. When alumni give, memory becomes mercy for the next student. This is not sentiment—it is responsibility. The Promise does not remove hardship. It teaches how to meet it with faith, discipline, and hope. Fiscal responsibility is a conviction allowing students to graduate without debt and be free to serve wherever God leads.

LINKING GENERATIONS ACROSS TIME

Picture a freshman carrying a suitcase into a residence hall. Years earlier, an alumnus did the same and has since built a life of service in church, community, and work. Alumni stand between those moments. The link is visible at Homecoming and at Alumni Reconnects. It is tangible when a graduate earns a first chance because another graduate opened a door. It continues when an alum shares a simple story of God's faithfulness. These are the human ties that move the Promise from one class to the next.

The future will bring cultural shifts, new technologies, and economic pressure. The essential questions remain.

If the Lord delays His coming and PCC reaches its centennial in 2075, its measure will not be found in buildings or programs. It will rest in the lives of those shaped here. Were minds grounded in truth? Were servants trained for the good

of others? Was excellence practiced as a habit? Was education kept within reach? And above all, was Christ honored?

Alumni will help supply that answer. Their prayers, their gifts, their guidance, and their example will shape the future more than any plan on paper.

THE PROMISE CARRIED FORWARD

Ministry, law, medicine, Christian education, business, engineering, and the arts provide different paths but converge on the same reality: preparation joined to conviction becomes service. The Promise travels with alumni into churches and clinics, classrooms and courts, boardrooms and laboratories. For the freshman unpacking and the senior stepping out, the path is marked. Others have gone before and stand ready to help those who follow with clarity, integrity, and hope.

The Promise is steady. Alumni are strong. Their faithfulness today will echo through the halls of PCC to the four corners of the globe for the glory of Christ.



HOPE CHILDREN'S HOME



Alumni serving at Hope Children's Home share a life-giving purpose: to love children in need and prepare them for the future.

Every child deserves a safe, loving, faithfilled home. At Hope Children's Home, several Pensacola Christian College alumni, along with other staff, work to give vulnerable children and infants bright futures. Matt Higgins (Bible '04), Mandy Higgins (studied Graphic Design '01-'04), and Ashley Hearns (Elementary Education '11, M.S. Educational Leadership '13) serve in Tampa, and Pastor Matt (Pastoral Ministries '00) and Dallita Goins (Nursing '00) serve in Honduras. Together, they support the ministry's urgent mission: to love children in need and equip them for the future. Children at the ministry receive living essentials, including shelter, meals, clothing, healthcare, and an education, and, best of all, a place to call "home" centered on the lifegiving love of lesus Christ.



CALLED TO CHILDREN'S **MINISTRY**

Matt Higgins and his wife Mandy share a desire to help children. They first became friends while they were attending PCC, Matt for Bible and Mandy for graphic design. As they got to know each other over their years in college, their friendship grew into love. Matt proposed to Mandy shortly before his graduation, and the couple was married a month after he received his Bible degree. As they looked forward, they began to pray about their future together. They imagined that Matt's studies would lead them to work in youth ministries, but God directed them down a different path. At the time, Matt's father was working at a Christian nonprofit called Hope Children's Home. He told Matt and Mandy that they were praying for a married couple to join the



administrative staff. The Higgins saw this opportunity to enter children's ministry as an answer to prayer. They were eager to start work immediately, so Mandy chose to follow Matt to the ministry before her fourth year of studying concluded.

Since 2004, Matt and Mandy have been serving at Hope Children's Home. They oversee the nonprofit's two locations in Tampa and Honduras along with its ministry for infants, Bundles of Hope. They have been able to use their skills from their liberal arts educations to provide administrative and media leadership that support the nonprofit's mission. As executive director, Matt ensures the nonprofit's administration operates smoothly. Mandy is the creative director, and she shares the mission with the public to gain supporters. "Every day we're reinforcing the things that God has called us to do, which is to love these children [and] prepare them for the future, to have a ministry that's Christ centered, and for the children to have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ," Matt said.

Matt and Mandy believe a distinct way Hope Children's Home helps children is by providing a support system into adulthood. When children graduate from the ministry's high school, they are assisted as they take on responsibility. Many choose to attend college, and Matt and Mandy frequently help graduates move to their chosen schools. Students are welcome to come back to the ministry on semester breaks. The message is clear: the door to home is always open. "What happens to the children when they turn 18?' That's a question we get a lot." Mandy said, "Because in the foster care system, you 'age out.' We say 18 is just another birthday it's family for life.'

LIFE AT HOME

A day at Hope Children's Home in Tampa combines education, play, family, and Christ's love to help children thrive. The children live in six colorful and spacious houses and are cared for each day by sets of cottage parents. These caretakers create loving, Christ centered homes. A child's day begins with waking up in his or her bedroom, a homecooked breakfast, and house devotions with cottage parents and other children. After busy school days, the children can explore the secure, green, 55-acre Tampa campus, climb the tree house, or use the two playgrounds. They also can compete in casual basketball and pickleball games at outdoor courts. After playtime, children eat dinner, have devotions, and are finally tucked into bed. House parents Lace Bonilla and her husband care for 14 children in their cottage. Watching over the children is deeply fulfilling for Lace. "[Being a house parent] is something I've always had a heart to do," Lace said, "and my husband really has a heart for children

Since they have stable, loving home lives, children can focus and excel at school. They attend the on-campus Hope Christian School, which provides a high-quality education exclusively for ministry children. PCC alumna Ashley Hearns is principal, and she is at the forefront of the school's mission: to equip students academically and spiritually, preparing them for success while strengthening their faith. Ashley has found that new arrivals are often academically behind, and she leads efforts to help them get back on track. The excellent education helps the children to change the trajectory of their lives. According to the nonprofit's website, 95% of graduates go to college. Ashley believes listening is crucial to helping children succeed. Her office door is always open to students—whether they have questions or simply want to talk. "[I want] to rebuild those relationships so that they feel like they have somebody on their side who will listen to them and is there to walk through life with them," Ashley said.

Beyond prioritizing education, recreation, and family, Hope Children's Home



encourages children to have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Children participate in house devotions, attend weekly worship services, and go to Christian camps during the summer. Through these activities, children hear the gospel and have an opportunity to respond to God's grace. Ashley believes seeing children saved and growing in Christ is a highlight of being principal. "Watching God transform their lives is one of the most beautiful parts of working here," Ashley said. "They haven't just learned that their past doesn't define them; they've embraced the truth that God defines them."

HOPE IN HONDURAS

The mission of Hope Children's Home goes beyond the United States, touching lives in Honduras. Matt and Mandy partner with PCC alumni and missionaries Pastor Matt and Dallita Goins to lead this location, giving the Goins primary administration of the home. Since 2004, Pastor and Mrs. Goins have been using their degrees in pastoral ministries and nursing to reach the Honduran people with the gospel at Iglesia Bautista El Faro. Through the partnership with Hope Children's Home, many children have been saved and bap-

tized. These children also have an opportunity to become church members and participate in Christian service. "I believe the most rewarding aspect of having the Hope Honduras partnership is the transformation of the gospel in the lives of the children," Pastor Goins said.

The ministry benefits Honduran children by providing them with a practical education that prepares them for life. Belkis Bonilla (*Nursing* '22) grew up at Hope Children's Home of Honduras and was its first graduate. Receiving a high-quality education propelled her to academic success. After graduating from high school, Belkis attended PCC and earned a degree in nursing, building a foundation for a fulfilling career and stable livelihood. Pastor Goins appreciates how providing an education allows the ministry to reach the Honduran community. He shared, "Hope Children's Home enables us to serve our community in unique ways, enhancing the reach of the local church."

Beyond equipping children for the future, the Goins do an even more important work through Hope's Children's Home: sharing the gospel. The Goins highlighted the testimony of Kathya, a child that came to the ministry because of childhood instability.

"Kathya came to us as a nine-year-old girl. She had never been to school," Mrs. Goins said. "Fast forward nine years with plenty of food to eat, a nice home and bed to sleep in, spiritual nourishment, genuine love and kindness, and Kathya is a beautiful 18-year-old that has learned to read, has a heart to serve, and, most importantly, has given her heart to Jesus!"

Through Hope Children's Home's ministry, hundreds of children like Belkis and Kathya have received a safe, faith-filled home where they experience the love of Jesus Christ and are prepared for the future. Over their years of service, these PCC alumni have seen God bless the ministry with enough resources for expansion. While still serving children in Tampa and Honduras, the ministry is moving forward to open as many as eight new Florida locations. From bringing together committed Christians like the Higgins and the Goins to meeting the ministry's needs, God has faithfully provided. The future is bright, and Hope Children's Home is prepared to provide lifegiving care to many precious children in the years to come. "God's hand is evident in the ministry of Hope Children's Home," Matt said. "It's a testimony to people who are fully committed to Christ, and He's blessing it. It's just miraculous."

Over 12,000 campers attended these camps, and many were led to the Lord. Dr. Mike Davis, the director of Youth Outreach Ministry, said, "This was one of our greatest summers of camp so far. Because student leaders stepped up, they had the opportunity to see God use them to make a difference for eternity. It is hard to fully describe the joy that comes from being present when a camper accepts Christ as Savior."



ALYSSA DEGARDE

This past year, Alyssa DeGarde (*Sr., Pre-Law, Music: Instrumental*) performed in orchestras at both the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., and Carnegie Hall in New York City. Her musical ability has opened many doors for her, and she gives all glory to God. "My heart is overwhelmed by the immeasurable love of our Savior—so vast, so undeserved, yet freely given. I was reminded that His love is not distant or abstract, but active, pursuing, and redeeming," she said.



YOM MISSIONS TEAMS

Visitors can enjoy the Atomic Museum, where they can learn the story of America's nuclear weapons program and gain a better understanding of nuclear power and its effects.



CAMPUS CHURCH INTERNS

Every summer, ministerial students have the opportunity to work with the Campus Church staff through the Edge Mentorship program. 

onstruction takes time, discipline, a plan—and it's costly. Yet the thrill of watching something take shape, of seeing the architect's vision become a reality, is incredibly rewarding. Jesus Himself said, "I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it" (Matthew 16:18). He presented Himself as the bedrock on which the Church would be built. As the Master Builder. He continues to do just that—building a living, called-out assembly of believers who seek to know God and make Him known.

Campus Church first opened its doors in 1974 with a clear purpose: to preach the gospel and make disciples. A further goal was to provide a place of shared worship-not only for those connected with the ministry

of Pensacola Christian College but also for the greater Pensacola community. For over 50 years, that purpose has remained unchanged. While every church shares a singular foundation, each is uniquely shaped to fit the time and culture in which it exists. Campus Church has a distinct opportunity to walk alongside college students, offering a place for worship, ministry involvement, and mentoring-all designed by God and just as relevant today as when Christ first established His Church 2,000 years ago.

One of the most meaningful ways Campus Church fulfills this mission is by serving, not as a replacement for a student's home church, but as a "home away from home." Here, students can worship, grow, and engage in the life of the church. This happens not only through shared worship services but also through a host of intentional connections. For example, we offer several small group settings like Lifeshare groups, Conquer Series for men, and Authentic Discipleship for women, providing students opportunities to connect with the larger body of Campus Church in a smaller, more personal setting. These groups allow for interaction, connection, deepening friendships, and accountability that is all a part of a healthy church. And they are available to everyone who is a part of our Campus Church family. Many of our college students have discovered that through small groups, even a large assembly like Campus Church begins to feel not just like "church" but like a church family.

To help deepen that sense of family at Campus Church, students are welcomed into the homes of church families for events like Family Game Night where they enjoy pizza and games after a Sunday night service. They participate in fun, church-wide fellowships throughout the year that include events like "Deacons vs. Ushers Wiffle Ball Game" or a kickball game that pits the Bible Study Group Leaders against PCC students who serve in leadership positions. These events, and others like them, help make a big church feel more personal and provide a refreshing atmosphere outside of the normal worship service schedule.

And every year, hundreds of students serve in ministries such as music, children and teens, hospitality, and outreach. Students sing in the choirs, join in a variety of orchestras, help behind the scenes with our livestream and TV ministries, lead services in nursing homes, greet guests with the hospitality teams, and so much more! And those participating are not only those who are training for ministry but also represent an incredibly diverse range of majors and areas of study. And really, isn't that exactly what every church should be doing—engaging believers from every walk of life to advance the work of the church in the lives of others, even as God is advancing His work in us?

As a graduate of PCC, I have the privilege of watching today's student body continue to benefit from the same "building tools" that were used in my own life so many years ago. The benefits and growth I experienced from Campus Church in the early 80s are still thriving today. What I received from this local church was not only timely, it was truly timeless. It is true that God is always building His Church. And to build His Church, He is building individual church members. What a blessing it is to see God doing both—building His Church

and its members—in part through student involvement and participation at Campus Church!


